Good morning, Mr. Weinold,

A person who is exercising the privileges of their U.S. pilot certificate must comply with the pertinent rules and requirements contained in part 61 (e.g., § 61.56 flight review requirements, recency-of-experience requirements, § 61.58 pilot-in-command (PIC) proficiency check, and § 61.51 required logbook entries) and in 14 CFR part 91. A flight review must have been administered by the holder of an FAA flight instructor certificate with the appropriate ratings. The proficiency checks administered by a foreign flight instructor do not meet the flight review requirements of § 61.56.

Comments: Dear team of the Airmen Certification Branch,

I have a question related to the Flight Review requirement for license holders under Title 14, §61.75 ("based on a foreign license"):

Must holders of an FAA Pilot Certificate issued under Title 14 §61.75 have a recent (ie. within the past 24 months) Flight Review in order to exercise the privileges of the license OUTSIDE the United States?

It seems to me that 14 CFR 61.75(e)(3) implies that this would be the case. However, the DPE-FPE which helped me complete my Title 14 §61.75 license application was of the opinion that a recent Flight Review was required only when flying in the United States.
